## 1 ABOUT THE INSTITUTION

---

Govt. College Dhaliara is a preferred choice among the best colleges of district Kangra. Despite its humble beginning, the institution kept a pragmatic approach and at present, emerged as one of the big colleges not-only in district Kangra but the whole state as well. With approximately enrollment of 2100 students in different streams, this institute now caters to the educational needs of not only five legislative constituencies viz., Dehra, Jaswan Pragpur, Chintpurni, Jawalamukhi & Jawali but all over H.P. as far as P.G. is concerned. With so much other potentials, the institution make endeavours in inculcating proficiency, sapience and rational skills among students. The institution believes in continuous upgradation of on-campus facilities and addition of new courses that endow the learners with new skills and knowledge upgradation. The courses offered are tailor-made for holistic development of students.

This college was established in July 1973 with Humanities by Sh. Kesho Dass from Pathankot and initially named after its founder as “Thakur Kesho Dass College”. The state government took over this college on 15 August 1984 and rechristened as Govt. College Dhaliara. Subsequently Science Stream (NM) was introduced in 1989, Commerce in 1996, and Medical group in 1999. Located in the serene and sylvan environment about 400 meters away from the Dhaliara market on Dharmshala Chandigarh National Highway 503, this college is an ideal place for learning and fulfilling the long-cherished dream of the people in the catchment area of approx. 45 kms. Besides this, this premier institution has BBA (with 40 subsidised and 20 non-subsidised seats); BCA(with 80 subsidised and 20 non-subsidised seats); and PGDCA(with 40 subsidised seats); under the Self-Financing Schemes and B.Voc in Retail Management and Hospitality & Tourism has been introduced from the session 2021-22 with 40 seats in each Course and has been running successfully. The institution also has a study center of Indra Gandhi National Open Unversity (1140) with 12 Certificate; 4 Diploma; 5 Degree; 6 Post Graduate; 3 PG Diploma Courses.

The college has a clean and green campus, a vast infrastructure having well-ventilated rooms; one virtual classroom; 9 smart classrooms; well-equipped laboratories; Five ICT labs; a well-stocked and digital library, book bank facility with public access from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM; a career guidance cell; two units of NSS; one unit of NCC; four units of Bharat Scouts & Guides; girls’ common room; one conference hall and one multipurpose hall, a clean drinking water facility with 4 water coolers, proper sanitation, two playgrounds and all under CCTV surveillance.

The college has progressed rapidly during the past years with many first and pioneering initiatives in academics, sports, and extra-curricular activities. To cater to the growing needs of the students and people of the area, M Sc. in Physics, Chemistry, M. Com, and MBA were started providing golden opportunities to the students thereby making it a Post Graduate College. Efforts are also being made to start an integrated four-

year B.Ed., MA in History, MA in Pol. Science, and M.Sc. in Mathematics. The institution also looking forward for constructing a Sports Complex, a Swimming Pool, and a Shooting Coaching Centre which will be developed further as a Sports Complex. A new Academic and Administrative Block is being constructed and soon will be inaugurated.

The New Science Block provides the students with various labs and internet facilities. Various Societies and Clubs provide a platform for the students in different fields for their all-round development. In the NAAC ranking framework the college is accredited as a much improved “B” Grade institution in 2019 and, thus takes pride in thanking the predecessors for providing the building blocks on which this present edifice of the college stands. With undaunted determination and perseverance of its incumbents, this college has flourished over the years and reached its pinnacle where it can boast of quality education.

## **5 ADMISSION**

### **5.1 GENERAL ADMISSION RULES**

1. Admission to various classes will be made on the recommendation of the admission committees constituted for the purpose.
2. Any gap (latest) in the academic career of an applicant must be supported by a documentary evidence/ affidavit as the proof of his/her activities during the period of gap.
3. A candidate seeking admission to first year of any course must be accompanied by his/her parent/guardian at the time of admission.
4. All admissions will be provisional subject to the approval of Vice-Chancellor, H.P. University Shimla
5. Admission will be strictly on fulfilment of eligibility conditions as fixed by HPU Shimla/ H.P. Govt.

#### **Note:**

- a) Rules for admission are subject to change as per HPU notifications/ H.P. Govt. Directions.

## **6 ELIGIBILITY**

### **6.1 FOR ADMISSION IN FIRST YEAR**

1. Student must have passed the Senior Secondary (+2) Examination (Academic Stream) conducted by the H.P. Board of School Education or an examination accepted as equivalent thereto by the various bodies of the University.
2. Candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with the science stream shall be given preference to admission in the B.Sc. program.
3. Candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with commerce stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Com. program. A candidate with Non-Medical and Economics or Mathematics having 45% in aggregate is also eligible for admission to B.Com.
4. Candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with arts stream/humanities shall be given preference in admission to BA program.
5. Candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with arts/science/commerce stream shall be given preference in admission to the B.Voc program.
6. The Candidate in the 1st Year of the UG Course will be admitted on merit basis (percentage of marks/grade obtained in 10+2 examination).
7. Student having compartment in the qualifying examination is not eligible for admission.

**Note:**

- a) Admissions to B.A./B.Sc./ B. Com. 1st year will be as per the final directions from the HPU/ H.P. Govt.

## **6.2 FOR ADMISSION IN SECOND OR THIRD YEAR**

---

1. Candidate must have appeared/passed the Previous Year's University Examinations. Other Conditions are as per University Norms.
2. The UG (TDC) programme is for a minimum period of three years and a maximum of five years from the date of admission of the candidate. Under annual system, (BA/B. Sc./ B. Com. Under (CBCS), the total credits for the pass course at undergraduate level is 132.

## **6.3 FOR DEGREE**

---

1. The candidate shall have to undergo the prescribed courses of study for a period not less than three academic years and not more than five academic year, pass the examinations prescribed and fulfil such conditions as have been prescribed therefor.
2. For the degree (B.A/ B.Sc. / B.Com) a student will have to accumulate 132 successful credit hours of entire coursework over a minimum of three and a maximum of five years from the date of admission.
3. Provided that not more than three attempts will be allowed to pass a course/subject.
4. The UG (TDC) programme is for a minimum period of three years and a maximum of five years from the date of admission of the candidate.

**Note:**

- a) Students admitted to the 2nd and 3rd year this session will follow all guidelines outlined in section 6.3.
- b) The guidelines for 1st-year students are subject to change based on the final directives from HPU regarding NEP implementation.

#### 6.4 STUDENTS COURSE WISE CONTINUOUS COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENT (CCA) AND EVALUATION

---

All courses involve an evaluation system of students that has the following components:

1. **Term End Examination:** It is of a three-hour duration, covering the whole syllabus of the course and counts for 70% in theory for Arts and Commerce where practical is not involved. For Science and the subjects/ courses where practical is involved, it is 50% in theory, 20% practical, and 30% in CCA/ IA.
2. **Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA):** For determining CCA following procedure is applicable:
  - i. 5 marks for attendance.
  - ii. 5 marks for class tests to be taken on completion of 40% of the syllabus by the class teacher.
  - iii. 10 marks for the house test to be taken on completion of 75% of syllabus.
  - iv. 10 marks for assignments, tutorials, and the general behaviour of students.
3. The minimum passing marks will be 40% in aggregate. However, 35% each in Internal Assessment and Final Examinations will be compulsory. For practical 40% passing marks will be compulsory and if a candidate fails to obtain 40% marks in practical will be treated as fail in that subject (As per university norms).
4. A candidate failing in either one or two subjects/papers will be given compartment in that subjects/papers and will be eligible for promotion to the next class. He/ She will appear in the subject/paper in which he/she has got the compartment. He/she will have two chances (one at the supplementary stage and one at the annual stage), available to him to clear his/her compartment in subjects/papers. He/she will not be awarded the degree until he/she clears all his/her courses within five years from the date of his/her admission to a particular course. A candidate failing in three or more subjects/papers will be treated as fail in that year and has to repeat the entire year.
5. The successful candidates will be classified on the combined results of the Part-I, II, III examinations as follows.
  - i. First Division 60 marks or more the aggregate
  - ii. Second Division : 50% marks but less than 60%
  - iii. Third Division : Less than 50%

#### 6.5 UPPER AGE LIMIT FOR ADMISSION

---

6. The maximum age limit for admission to B.A./B.Sc./B. Com courses is 23 years for male candidates who belong to the general category and 25 years for girls as on 1<sup>st</sup> June of the current session.
7. A relaxation of 3 years is applicable to candidates belonging to SC/ ST category.
8. The Vice-Chancellor may permit age relaxation up to a maximum of 6 months.

**Note:** Conditions are liable to change as per university notifications from time to time.

### 6.6 MIGRATION

---

1. Candidates coming from Boards/Universities other than H.P. Board of School Education/Himachal Pradesh University must produce original migration certificate enclosed with the Application Form.
2. Those, who have passed first year/second year of a degree course from other than H.P. University, will have to acquire Equivalence certificate of H.P. University course/Syllabus.
3. Candidates, seeking migration from affiliated colleges of HPU, shall have to apply on the prescribed form.

### 7 ADMISSION PROCESS

## 10 CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)

- Choice based Credit System (CBCS):** the CBCS provides choice for students to select from the prescribed courses (core, discipline specific elective, skill enhancement, ability enhancement, generic courses)
- Course:** Usually referred to, as 'papers', is a component of a programme. All courses need not carry the same weight. The courses should define learning objectives and learning outcomes. A course may be designed to comprise lectures/tutorials/laboratory work/field work/outreach activities/project work/vocational training/viva/ seminar/term papers/ assignment/ presentations/self-study etc. or a combination of some of these.
- Credit point:** It is the product of grade point and number of credits for a course.
- Credit:** A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching (lecture or tutorial) or two hours of practical work/ field work per week.

5. **Cumulative Grade point Average (CGPA):** It is a measure of overall cumulative performance of a student over all semesters. The CGPA is the ratio of total credits of all courses in all the semesters. It is expressed up to two decimal places.
6. **Grade point:** It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10 point scale.
7. **Letter Grade :** It is an index of the performance of students in a said course. Grades are denoted by letters which are specified in section 10.2
8. **Programme:** An educational programme leading to award a Degree, diploma or certificate.
9. **Transcript or Grade Card or Certificate:** Based on the grades earned, a grade certificate shall be issued to all the registered students after every Semester/Year. The grade certificate will display the course details (Code, title, number of credits)

### 10.1 TYPES OF COURSES UNDER CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM

---

- 1 **Discipline Specific Course (DSC) or Core Course (CC):** A course which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a DSC or CC.
- 2 **Elective Course:** Generally, a course that can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope, or which enables exposure to some other discipline/ subject/ domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/ skill is called an Elective Course.
- 3 **Discipline-Specific Elective (DSE) Course:** Elective courses may be offered by the main discipline/ subject of study is referred also offer discipline related Elective courses of interdisciplinary nature (to be offered by the main discipline/ subject of study).
- 4 **Dissertation/ Project:** An elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/ support study to project work, and a candidate studies such a course on his own with advisory support by a teacher/ faculty member is called a dissertation/ project.
- 5 **Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC)/ Competency Improvement Courses/ Skill Development Courses/ Foundation Course:** The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses may be of two kinds: AE Compulsory Course (AECC) and AE Elective Course (AEEC).
- 6 **AE Compulsory Course (AECC):** “AECC” courses are courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement. They are:
  - i. Environmental Science
  - ii. English/ MIL Communication, mandatory for all disciplines.
- 7 **AE Elective Course (AEEC) or Skill Enhancement Course (SEC):** AEEC or SEC courses are value-based and/ or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on

training, competencies, skills, etc. These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value – based and/ or skill-based instruction.

## 10.2 LETTER GRADES AND GRADE POINT

- 1 Two methods-relative grading or absolute grading- are in vogue for awarding grades in a course. The relative grading is based on the distribution (usually normal distribution) of marks obtained by all the students of the course and the grades are awarded based on cut-off marks or percentile. Under the absolute grading, the marks are converted to grades based on pre-determined class intervals. To implement the following grading system, the college and universities can use one of the above methods.
- 2 The HPU Shimla recommends a 10-point grading system with the following letter grades as given below:

- 3 A student obtaining Grade F shall be considered failed and will be required to reappear in the examination.
- 4 The universities can decide on the grade or percentage of marks required to pass in a course and also the CGPA required to qualify for a degree taking into consideration the recommendations of the statutory professional councils such as AICTE, MCI, BCI, NCTE etc.

## 10.3 CLASSROOM ATTENDANCE

Each student will have to attend a minimum of 75% of Lectures/ Tutorials/ Practical. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the Term End Examination.

- 1 Provided that those having attendance between 74% and 65% attendance will apply for exemption in a prescribed form accompanied by clear reason(s) for absents, to the authorized functionaries.
- 2 Provided that those having between 64% and 50% attendance will apply for exemption in a prescribed form accompanied by a Medical Certificate from a Government Hospital.
- 3 Provided that an exemption from 75% attendance will be given to those participating in prescribed co-curricular activities (e.g., NCC, NSS, Youth Festivals, Sports, etc.) to the extent of 25% (making the necessary attendance as 50% in these cases). However, the claim for this exemption should be supported by an authenticated certificate from the concerned college authorities.
- 4 Provided further that those getting the exemptions, except for those getting exemptions for co-curricular activities will not be entitled to getting the CCA marks for classroom attendance as given below.
- 5 Those having greater than 75% attendance will be awarded CCA marks as follows:

> 75% but < 80%	1 mark
> 80% but < 85%	2 marks
> 85% but < 90%	3 marks
> 90% but < 95%	4 marks
> 95%	5 marks

Besides maintaining the Attendance, A candidate is also required to fulfil the following conditions to appear in the annual exams: -

- (i) 100% submission of assignments.
- (ii) **It shall be compulsory to score a minimum of 50% marks (aggregate) in the mid-term examination.**
- (iii) It shall also be mandatory to participate in the activities of subject societies.

University, Shimla. The students may go for a job or become an entrepreneur or continue studying for the M.Voc. or they can take admission in any other Master Programmes.
- ✓ The students can appear in **any competitive exams across the country**, i.e. conducted by the State Public Service Commission and Union Public Service Commission.
- ✓ Job-oriented skill development training programmes.
- ✓ Placement Assistance through well-established vibrant placement cell.
- ✓ A maximum of **40 students** will be admitted to each B.Voc. Programme.

## 2) Eligibility Conditions

## 5) Selection Process

Admission to the Bachelor of Vocation (B.Voc.) Program in Retail Management and Hospitality & Tourism for Semester I will be conducted solely based on merit derived from the qualifying examination, specifically the 10+2 level. There are three distinct categories of candidates eligible for admission to Semester I of the skill-based courses under the National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF).

**Category 1** comprises students who have obtained National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF) certification at Level 4 within a specific industry sector and are eligible to enroll in skill-based courses under the NSQF framework.

**Category 2** includes students who have also achieved NSQF certification at Level 4 but wish to transition to skill-based courses in a different trade.

**Category 3** consists of students who have completed the 10+2 examination through traditional educational pathways and do not possess any prior vocational training experience. Vocational subjects recognized under the National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF) will be accorded an equivalent weightage to that of general education subjects when evaluating candidates for admission to undergraduate

programs, as stipulated in the University Grants Commission (UGC) reference number DD No. 1-52/2013 (CC/NSQF) dated April 30, 2014. In the context of student selection for the Bachelor of Vocation (B.Voc.) program, an additional weightage of 10% will be awarded to candidates classified as Category I, while those in Category II will receive an additional 5% weightage based on their performance in the 10+2 examination. The final admission list will be determined based on the combined merit of all candidate categories.

### 6) Dress Code

The designated uniform comprises a white shirt, black trousers, a black tie, and a black belt during the summer months, with the addition of a black blazer and a black sweater in the winter season. Furthermore, the uniform mandates the wearing of black leather shoes and socks. It is essential to highlight that a penalty of Rs. 50 will be enforced for non-compliance with the uniform policy.

### 7) Internship Program

The internship will contribute credits that will be incorporated into the final assessment of skill components. The Himachal Pradesh Kaushal Vikas Nigam (HPKVN) is providing full sponsorship for the internship, in addition to supporting the skill component, which constitutes 60% of the program, along with the provision of course materials for the entirety of the program. Participants enrolled in this program are eligible to receive the 'Kaushal Vikas Bhatta' in accordance with state government policy. The curriculum for the Bachelor of Vocational (B. Voc.) program will be delivered in English.

## 20 IMPORTANT INSTRUCTIONS

---

### A. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

1. It is mandatory for every student to maintain strict discipline within the College campus as well as outside the College.
2. Any act performed by the student that amounts to discipline will be dealt with strictly.
3. All the students are required to read the notices thoroughly which are displayed exclusively on the College Notice Board every day and do the needful accordingly.
4. Teasing girl students in any manner whatsoever is an offence punishable under the law. Hence, students are advised not to indulge in such kinds of activities; otherwise, they would face strict legal action.
5. Scribbling/ writing anything on the black board, on furniture and walls etc. is a part of indiscipline.
6. Removing or causing damage to the furniture or windowpanes, plucking flowers, removing notices, etc. is also a breach of discipline.
7. The following acts also tent amount to indiscipline: holding any meeting/ function/ party and photography in the premises of the College without prior permission of the principal.
8. Students should not tamper with the electrical fittings, water fittings etc. in the classrooms, hostel and in the College campus.
9. Using foul language with any student, teacher or any other employee of the College shall be viewed seriously.
10. The use of cell phone is strictly prohibited inside the classrooms and any breach of conduct will result in the confiscation of the cell phone.

### B. IDENTITY CARD

1. Identity card is the most important document of the college student, because it is the only identification for anyone to establish that one is a student of the college.
2. Any transaction between students and college is entertained only after production of Identity card. If a student has to deal with any kind of work related to examination, library, collection/ inspection of documents, and one has to produce one's Identity card in order to establish one's identity.
3. Students are not permitted to replace the photograph pasted on the Identity card for any reason whatsoever.
4. If an Identity card is lost, one has to file an F.I.R. in order to get a duplicate Identity card issued.
5. In the event of inspection of Identity card during surprise check or for any other reason, if the student is unable to produce the Identity card, he/ she will be handed over to the police or as the situation may demand. **Student without Identity card is deemed as outsider.**

6. In case, the Identity card gets misplaced, misused by anti-social elements the student concerned shall be held responsible for his/her deeds. It is the personal responsibility of the student to keep his/ her identity card in safe custody.
7. All the students are directed to collect their identity cards and complete the formalities related to their identity cards within one week of admission.

### **C. LEAVE RULES**

1. A student can proceed on leave with prior permission from the Principal but the application should be signed by the parent/guardian of the student and duly recommended by the tutor/concerned teacher.
2. A tutor/class teacher can sanction leave upto 3 days while a leave application upto 7 days is to be sanctioned by the Chief Tutor / Principal. Leave for more than 7 days is to be sanctioned by the Principal only.
3. The leave application must be submitted by the applicant or, in case of medical leave, by the parents/guardian. The applicant must ensure that the application is properly sanctioned and that the concerned subject teachers have duly signed it.
4. Leave on account of illness, if it is for more than three day, must be accompanied by a medical certificate/ Registration Slip by Government Hospital.
5. Student may proceed on any kind of leave but he/she must deposit his/her fees/fines on the appropriate day. Otherwise his/ her admission will stand cancelled. Similarly, he/she is also required to return the books on the fixed day.
6. Students participating in inter-college games or other competitions must have their leave sanctioned and duly noted by the concerned subject teachers prior to the event.
7. Leave during House Examinations will be sanctioned by the Principal only.

### **D. FINE AND PENALTIES**

1. Failure to pay dues on due date will entail a fine of Rs. 1 per day.
2. In case a student does not deposit his/her dues on or before the due date, his/her name will be struck off from the roll.
3. The name of the student shall also be struck off from the roll, if he/she remains absent without leave for continuous more than 10 days in any class(Theory/Practical).
4. In case the name of a candidate is struck off, the re-admission is permissible within first 10 days with a first readmission fee of Rs. 100/-. If a candidate fails to seek readmission within first 15 days then he/she should seek re-admission upto 20 days, on the payment of Rs. 200/- as second re-admission fee on the personal presence of parent/guardian with documentary proof. After 20 days from the date his/her name is struck off, there shall be no readmission in any case. The readmission will be done on the recommendation of concerned teachers and approval of Principal.

5. The Principal can expel a student from the college if he/she is found guilty of misconduct, drug abuse or any other illegal activity.
6. Every student will have to procure No-dues certificate from college Library/ concerned department/ N.S.S/ N.C.C / Sports/ R & R /College Canteen etc. if he/she leaves the college.
7. The security deposit will lapse if a student does not apply for refund of security within one year of his/her leaving the college.
8. Other fines will be as given below
  - Absence for one period = Rs. 1/-
  - Absence for one Practical = Rs.3/-
  - Absence in House Exam = Rs 20/- per paper

The college library has 15,000 books in various subjects, magazines, leading dailies and fully computerized and ‘N-Listed’ for scholarly content. This programme provides access



to journals, e books. Library management software **SOUL-3.0** has been installed to automate entire housekeeping operation of the library. Book Bank gives the facility to poor and helpless students to get the textbooks for a semester.

***All the students are required to adhere to the following Library rules strictly:***

- i. All the students on the rolls of the College shall be eligible to become members of the College library.
- ii. Every student is entitled to borrow two books for a period of 15 days from the library.
- iii. The borrower shall be solely responsible for the safety/ preservation of the books drawn by him/ her.
- iv. A fine of Rs. 1/-per day per book will be charged beyond the due date of return of the book.
- v. In case a book is found mutilated, torn, defaced or misplaced, the actual cost of the book plus 20% of the original cost will be charged from the student.
- vi. Reference books are to be consulted in the library itself after obtaining permission from the Librarian.
- vii. The College also operates a book bank from which textbooks are loaned to poor students of all categories on payment of a nominal security, (i.e. actual cost plus 20% and maintenance charge of Rs.2/-per book}.

***Students can get their library security refunded within one year after leaving the College; otherwise, the security stands forfeited.***

### 10) PTA

A Parent- Teachers Association was established in 1994 with the objective to have participation of parents for all round development of the institution. The executive committee of the PTA is elected during the month of August every year. There is a General Body of P.T.A. comprising:

## RAGGING: A PUNISHABLE OFFENCE

### PROHIBITION OF RAGGING UNDER H.P. EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS ACT

(PROHIBITION OF RAGGING ACT, 2009) defines 'Ragging' as doing any act, by disorderly conduct to a student of an educational institution, which causes or is likely to cause physical or psychological harm or raising apprehension or fear or shame or embarrassment to the student. Such disorderly conduct includes, teasing or abusing or playing practical jokes on or causing hurt to such students or asking a student to do any act or perform something which such student, will not be willing to do in the ordinary course. A student who commits the offence of ragging shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years or shall also be liable to a fine which may extend to Rs.50,000 or both. If a student is convicted of the charges of committing, abetting, participating or propagating ragging, he shall be dismissed from the college and such student will not get admission in other colleges for a period of three years from the date of his dismissal from the college.
